- ☒ Other: Safety for cyclists in Moreland is varied. We have some areas, like the Southern section of the Upfield Bike Path, that are well-lit and signed. However there are other areas that aren't safe -- especially Sydney Road and the northern part of the Upfield Bike Path. There are significant safety issues for people riding bikes in Moreland and with the increasing number of riders, it will only become a bigger issue if the necessary protections are not addressed. To ensure the safety of riders there needs to be appropriate infrastructure, clear signage, separation from motorised traffic and high-quality lighting. Though the level of bike safety is varied across Moreland, the Greens know commuter and recreational sections of the municipality which require urgent attention. Moreland City Council needs to create a robust and coordinated relationship with VicRoads and VicTrack in order to progress many bicycle related projects - areas of significant concern are along Cumberland Road, Gaffney Street, Sydney Road, Box Forest Road and the Upfield Shared Path.

The previous Greens councillors were instrumental in boosting the \$/person in previous budgets beyond \$5 and will continue to do so as we feel that is not an adequate amount given the increased use of bikes in Moreland.

All Greens councillors have been part of the cycling community, so have a lived connection with cycling and the promotion of it - what better promotion of cycling is there, when your local Councillors ride a bike over the same area that you do?

- Cycling is a great way to get around – it cuts pollution and congestion, helps the environment and improves the health of ourselves and our city. Moreland has a very active cycling culture and Council has a responsibility to ensure cycling is as safe and accessible as possible.

The Greens will increase funding on cycleways and walkways by 50%. This will enable Council to hasten the implement the Moreland Bicycle Strategy 2011-2021 including: completing the upgrade and lighting of the Upfield Shared Path; completing gaps in the Merri creek trail; improving bicycle parking at train stations and throughout the city and continuing to ensure developers integrate bicycle facilities into new dwellings.

The Greens will also advocate for more separated bikes lanes for safer travel, including on Sydney Road, Cumberland Road and Gaffney Street. We realise the relationship between Council and VicRoads and VicTrack needs to be strong and will work towards developing and maintaining those links.

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
